Sorbus aucuparia (Mountain Ash) aka Rowan	Native small tree with red berries & white flowers	6m after 10 years (can reach 15m)	4m after 10 years (upto 8m)	Native, long lived (upto 200 years), happily pruned. Very wildlife friendly pollinators and berries for birds	
Sorbus 'Eastern Promise'	Smaller than Mountain Ash with white flowers, rose/pink berries, pinnate leaves that turn purple and orange in autumn	6m	4m	Close relation to Mountain Ash. Bird & pollinator friendly	
Malus (crabapple) Evereste	Upright-ish crabapple with pink buds (April) and white scented flowers and red orange fruits	4m	4m	Superb ornamental and wildlife value. Disease resistant	
Malus (crabapple) John Downie	Pure white flowers, with yellow/red fruits	4m	4m	Disease resistant. Excellent pollinator tree (very long flowering season)	

Prunus Spire (ornamental cherry)	fairly small, pillar- shaped cherry very suitable as a street tree. Blooms early with white-pink flowers and turns beautifully red to purple-red in autumn	5-10m	5m	Single early blossom for pollinators	
Amelanchier ovalis Medik (Snowy Mespilus or common Amelanchier )	White flowers in early spring, red then black fruits, good autumn colour	4-8m	2.5 - 4m	Good for pollinators and birds. Ensure standard specimen.	 <small>shutterstock.com • 694350442</small>
Crataegus monogyna stricta (upright hawthorn)	a wealth of white flowers in late spring followed by conspicuous red berries in autumn. The thorny branches are densely packed with small green leaves. Good for street trees.	6m	2m	Form of our native hawthorn but much narrower with branches growing upwards rather than spreading. Excellent for pollinators & Birds.
