

The Freshford Newsletter



The Bulletin was a key source of community information, and was well-liked. The last Bulletin could not be completed in Spring 2020 due to the first lockdown.

With the advent of the Parish Magazine, which was an excellent publication and proved to be very popular, the Bulletin was becoming more and more difficult to produce as advertisers moved away to the Parish Magazine due to the wider circulation.

With this in mind, consideration was being given to moving the Bulletin to an online presence to overcome the high costs of production.

The situation that arose during Covid, including changes in Councillors, meant that many things went on hold, including creating an online Bulletin. With the demise of the Parish Magazine, this has left a hole in the wider communications within Freshford.

Communications within Freshford has moved forward in the last 2 years due to:

- A new Parish Communications email system
- A new Freshford website with new functionality

The Parish Communications email system was moved from a basic email format to using an online facility built for communications, called MailChimp. This facility now provides a modern means of email communication available to the community.

The Parish Council website needed to be upgraded to a new platform to meet new legal requirements. The website has been completely redesigned and now fully meets Accessibility standards, meaning that it can be fully accessed and used by the visually impaired.

The new website provides a modern and accessible platform that is available to be used by all groups within the community. The website is very configurable with key new functionality making information much more readily available, such as News Items, Events, an Events Calendar and an internal search facility.

The current situation provides all groups and activities within the community to:

- Send emails to the community - currently received by over 400 people
 - Inform through News Items
-

·Publicise through Events and the Events Calendar

These were important aspects of the Bulletin, and using Community Emails and website makes the information constantly available and without cost overheads.

The Events Calendar should ideally list everything happening within the community. Please do let the PC know by email: freshford.comms@outlook.com or by ringing John Putt for further details. The future of the Newsletter is being considered, and the current thinking is to:

- Provide a periodic short Newsletter via email
- Put this Newsletter on the noticeboards
- Provide copies of the Newsletter at The Galleries

Basically, similar to the current Limpley Stoke Update.

UPDATE ON THE BUILDING WORKS AT ST PETER'S CHURCH

We are delighted to write that work finally started on the reordering of St Peter's Church at the end of March. It is expected to last approximately six months.

First and foremost, our vision was to create an accessible building for all by incorporating a paved ramp. However, this not only involves improving the access on the outside of the building but also creating more space indoors for maximum flexibility.

Most of the pews have been removed and chairs will be installed in their place. This gives us the opportunity to hold different forms of church services, but will also allow us to create a larger space which can be adapted for other community activities.

The church will be redecorated, and will have a much improved heating system. Our lighting and sound system will also be upgraded. A wheelchair accessible toilet will be installed and there will be a kitchen servery for refreshments.

As a group, we feel privileged and excited to be part of this first major change to our church building in over a century. We are very grateful to those who have supported the project so far, and we look forward to opening our doors again with a warm welcome to all!

The galleries extension updates

With a massive thank you for your support,

FLiSCA project team - FIRST

We are delighted to announce that the planners have FINALLY approved the extension for the Galleries which means we can start work on this project in the near future. As you might remember from our business plan (available on request), the project is essential for the future proofing of our beloved café and shop and, by using local volunteers alongside a local contractor, we've been able to reduce the cost of the extension. But, not helped by recent inflationary pressures, it will still cost an estimated £105,000.

The Board of FLiSCA have agreed to invest £25,000 of FLiSCA's reserves towards this project and we have raised a further £57,500 in grants from Limpley Stoke Parish Council, Freshford Parish Council, Friends of Freshford, the Medlock Trust Foundation, Hills Landfill, Bath Rotary, the Lotteries Community Fund and the Bernard Sunley Foundation. However, we are still £22,500 short of the funding required to complete this project.



YOUR VILLAGE AGENT



Hello, I wanted to introduce myself as Freshfords new, and first, Village Agent. My name is Chantal Young, I started this role at the beginning of May and I work for the West of England Rural Network (WERN). We are a charity that works in partnership with B&NES Council with a core focus of supporting the health and wellbeing of rural communities who can often feel cut off from a range of public services which residents living in urban areas access more easily.

Our support is there for any adult 18 years and older who is struggling personally, emotionally, medically and financially and who needs help to find solutions to these kinds of issues but doesn't know where to start looking and how to access organisations who could help. I provide a confidential and free "triage service" listening to the resident and then signposting and introducing them to the organisations who could help or to the information they need. I have already been welcomed by the Freshford Parish Council and I am now trying to make myself more visible in the community. As a service we have been operating in the west of the B&NES region for 10 years and we are now able to offer the service in this area.

Typically we support residents who are struggling with loneliness and want more social contact, or who have financial worries and are unaware of the different avenues that could offer help, people needing different levels of care to stay well and safe at home, people returning home from hospital and who might need short term support or something more permanent, people who need practical help in the home and don't know who to trust. It varies enormously....and we are very good at helping to find solutions amongst the huge network of public, private and charitable organisations we work alongside.



Speed watch

In the five or so years that Freshford Speed Watch has been in existence travel volume through the village has increased, with a hiatus occurring during lockdown, and so have recorded speeds. The problem times are early morning, late afternoon, and early evening, and during the school pick up, although quiet afternoons offer an enticing space for a spot of the Formula Ones. Speeds of up to 40 mph have been recorded on Freshford Lane (the equivalent of 140 mph on a motorway) and over 30 mph on the High Street. It is, however, really pleasing to report that most vehicles are being driven with some attention paid to the 20mph speed limit (even if more often in the breach than the observance), the narrowness of the roads and pavements, and with consideration to the people who live here.



Because our hi vis jackets are easily spotted by potential speeders who can take quick remedial action, and because we're only occasionally present, comprehensive collection of data isn't possible. To help us get a fuller picture, Limpley Stoke PC has offered us the loan of one of its Speed Monitoring Devices which records volume and speed of passing vehicles throughout the day. Freshford PC has granted permission for us to use it to gather data. Our intention is then to pass the data on to the PC together with recommendations on how it may best be used.

What is LINK?

LINK is a voluntary service run by both villages providing transport to those for whom public transport is either unavailable or inappropriate. Its activities were much reduced during the pandemic, but it is now fully up and running again. During Lockdown and the pandemic, it also helped deliver prescriptions to people shielding or otherwise unable to collect them. This service continues.

To make a reservation, ring the Coordinator on the number above. If there is an answerphone, leave details and your phone number, and every effort will be made to get you where you wish to go. But, please, try to give at least two days' notice.


This is a service run by volunteers, but donations are welcome to help defray costs such as insurance, the coordinator's phone and the direct cost to the volunteer driver of taking you to and from your destination. The drivers have envelopes stamped with the LINK name for donations, which can either be returned to the driver who will pass them on or handed in at the Galleries shop. While donations are welcome - LINK cannot run without them - they are not compulsory and, by being in a sealed envelope, are anonymous.

Freshford and Limpley Stoke Home Energy Group

The excitingly named FLHEG (Freshford and Limpley Stoke Home Energy Group) is continuing its efforts to improve knowledge within the two communities about saving energy and reducing carbon emissions from home energy use. We have a webpage on the Freshford website under the heading of Climate Emergency. This motivation has now been added to by the energy crisis.

On the 20th June we organised an evening event at Freshford Village Hall on the topic of heat pumps and particularly air source heat pumps (ASHP).

34 people attended to listen to two presentations. The first was a wide-ranging review of heat pumps, how they work, costs, benefits, government grants, and how to find a good supplier. This was given by WDS Green Energy of Cardiff. The second was much shorter, covering a retrofit in Limpley Stoke by one of the FLHEG steering group. There was a lively Q&A during both during the presentations and at the end. The presentations from WDS and the home retrofit are available on the FLHEG web page.

Freshford Scouts



When covid struck in 2020, it was heartbreaking to accept that scouting adventures – like all group activities – would have to be put on hold. We missed our Beavers, Cubs and Scouts, and wondered when we would again enjoy their curiosity, spirit and laughter. Fast forward two years and we are thrilled to have returned to what we all love most – bringing together groups of young people to learn life skills, grow as adventurers, give back and have fun. Our numbers have swelled and today we provide exciting opportunities for 60 local youngsters, aged 6-14 – and we even have waiting lists of enthusiasts wishing to join us.

Highlights this year for our Beavers have included visiting Bath Fire Station and aiming the hose from a fire engine into a training building, learning how to light fires (and then toast marshmallows on them!), understanding how to administer first aid, and practising simple navigation in the dark.

The Cubs have cycled from Bathampton back to Freshford, learnt essential bike maintenance skills, spent a night ‘camping out’ in the village hall, and earned their Cooks badge. And the Scouts have developed their knife and saw skills, practised firefighting and learned about bushcraft.

Surveys & planning

Since acquiring the Hop Pole in February, we've been busy making the building safe and carrying out the numerous surveys required before we can start resuscitating the pub. Obtaining Listed Building Consent and Planning Permission for an extension to a Grade II listed building is an involved process but we're making good headway and are in an ongoing dialogue with Wiltshire Planners and Historic England. The design work is now underway and hope to be in a position to submit our full planning application in the early autumn.

Share certificates

We are beavering away on our computers and hope to distribute share certificates to all our shareholders later this month.

£250,000 grant

We have passed our first hurdle and are delighted to announce that we have been successful with our Expression of Interest for the £250k Community Ownership Fund grant and, with the help of our fund raiser consultant, Sandra Macaskill, hope to be one of the first applicants to submit our application soon. We will hear the results on 19th October - please keep your fingers crossed for us.

Avoncliff wood

It's been an eventful few years since we took on ownership of Avoncliff Wood in 2019. Trees and woods are being recognised as ever more important tools in fighting the twin threats of the wildlife and climate crises, helping to create a more resilient landscape for both wildlife and people.

At Avoncliff Wood we've been busy planting, fixing, mending, building and creating space for wildlife and the public. The feedback has been terrific, we've made some great friends in the community, we have some incredible volunteers, and even made national television and radio.

We've learnt so much about the wildlife in the ancient wood through our 'Living Laboratory' - monitoring the species affected by ash dieback over a 25 year period. We have one of the UK's biggest trial sites for researching alternative plastic-free tree shelters - which has helped the Trust and many of our partners pledge to stop using plastic shelters and hugely reduce the millions of plastic shelters used in tree planting. 
The trees and shrubs local children and volunteers planted will provide a valuable home for wildlife for hundreds of years, storing valuable carbon and protecting the soils that do the same, and hopefully helping to halt the decline of wildlife populations that is affecting so many species of animals and plants in the UK. And the paths and benches will remain open 365 days a year, every year for many lifetimes, for people to walk through and appreciate the wildlife we all created at this fantastic site.



The station garden report

The garden on the Bath bound platform of Freshford Station is once again looking in very good condition after the two years of lockdown times when the volunteers could not work down there. Paul Jupp has taken over the overseeing role and is bringing a new eye to the planting. You'll notice, if you have been down at the Station, that the roundel in front of the Freshford sign has been planted up with a wild flower seed mixture and will make a magnificent show in July.

Funding for the professional guidance of the volunteers historically came from the Community Rail Partnership and Friends of Freshford. As a result of the Government taking on responsibility for funding the railways in lockdown, there has been a major cutback in any funding from the Railway to volunteer groups, so we are very grateful that the Parish Council stepped in this year to fund the professional overseeing.



The garden is designed to be totally organic and sustainable – all the plants are chosen to be able to flourish despite no watering. We are hoping this year to create compost bins at the end of the platform and use some of the waste area to grow some globe artichokes and rhubarb for community use next year! The volunteer gardeners meet six times a year to give an hour or so of their time, under Paul's supervision, to work on the maintenance of the garden. A number of volunteers have recently retired for various reasons and we would very much welcome any potential volunteers. You certainly do not need to be an experienced gardener! It is a great opportunity to learn how plants work together to form a delightful canvas through the season, share experiences and tips and even take home some cuttings for your own garden.
