
The Freshford Newsletter Autumn 2023

We are delighted that St Peter's is now fully functioning in the way that we'd hoped. We have had a series of weddings and funerals over the Summer months, as well as two services for the children of Freshford School.

At one of the school services, we had a professional dancer, Synaet, from Cambodia. She performed an amazing dance based on the creation story in the book of Genesis. Both children and adults were spellbound, and it could only happen with our new flexible space!

It has been heartwarming to see those with limited mobility as well as those with children in buggies, able to access the church easily and then, once inside, finding it easy to move about freely.

A quick glance through the visitors book is a strong indication of how many people call in when they're passing. Different nationalities and creeds, walkers and local people who just want somewhere quiet to think, pray or simply visit.

We are now looking forward to making it available for wider use by the community. As many of you already know, we are completely self-funding and rely on the giving of church members as well as the generosity of others to keep it all going, in addition to a wonderful group of volunteers who help to keep it clean, decorated with flowers and open each day.

All these things work on a rota basis, so it really is a case of the more the merrier. We are hoping to set up a rota soon to keep the clock ticking and chiming....please let us know if you would be able to help with any of these things, even if only rarely. No special skills required, and it honestly makes all the difference!

THE CHURCH

Martin Walker, our dear friend and church surveyor, who sadly died recently, will be greatly missed by us all. He worked tirelessly for our church over many years, including carrying out our required building inspections at no charge.



More recently, he was heavily involved with our steering group in coordinating its refurbishment. Without his professional expertise, it would certainly have been much harder to achieve its transformation. Whilst he worked on many different projects around Freshford, he regarded St Peter's Church as the most important building in the village, steeped in history and an oasis of calm for many. A special place.

We have a group known as the Friends of St Peter's Church, and Martin was one of its founder members. Its aim is to support the fabric of this historic building and, through various fundraising activities and membership subscriptions, it has assisted with repair work, etc. Its membership comprises a wide range of people who may have no connection with the church other than its value as a unique and special building in our village. The group has been dormant for a while, partly due to covid, but also during the restoration work, and we would now like to rejuvenate it in Martin's memory. He believed that we now have a building fit for the 21st century, and we really want to build on the recent achievements.

THE HISTORY SOCIETY

Freshford & District Local History Society



We were very lucky to finish last year's LHS events with over 30 members enjoying a guided tour of Hinton Priory by Margaret Dodge, a very popular trip out. Our new F&D LHS programme started on 27th Sept. Those attending were entertained by a talk on 'Bath and its local government in 1800' by Rose Wallis, a Senior Lecturer from the University of the West of England. At the end of the 18th Century the local Magistrates or Justices of the Peace were responsible for both criminal judicial proceedings and local Government administration, including such social security as existed. They were unpaid and untrained, their authority based as much on their social status as gentlemen as on their office. With a rising population, war and political agitation, economic depression, increasing poverty and crime and, believe it or not in this locality, growing tourism, the Magistracy faced unprecedented challenges. Though much has changed in the intervening years, surprisingly much remains the same.

Over the Summer we enjoyed two outings in June to nearby gardens. The first was to Coleford House where we were met by the charming owner, James Alexandroff who led 33 of us round his large garden, entertaining us with anecdotes which included buying up some surrounding cottages and showing us his considerable collection of classic cars which form part of the assets of his philanthropic business in Africa. He served us with a delicious tea on his own as his wife had chosen to be out for the day. The second visit was to Cortington Manor, just outside Warminster: nearly everyone got lost en route but eventually 28 of us enjoyed seeing round this exceptional garden where, again, we were greeted by the owner with a brief introduction and later treated to tea outside.



Our Annual Flower Show recommenced on 2 September after lapsing last year due to the prolonged drought. Biodiversity projects on the Tyning Having spent the past two years planting 18 bollard trees, 3 heritage trees, 3 coppice trees, 30 metres of native hedge, an orchard of 12 fruit trees as well as thousands of seeds and bulbs, 2023 has been a year of plant maintenance and TLC.

Luckily, we've not experienced a drought this year, in fact quite the reverse, so watering hasn't been a problem, and we are pleased to report that most of our planting has done very well. The new native hedge is a good example. Despite the small size of the whips from the Woodland Trust, the majority have survived, and any infilling will be undertaken in early Spring 2024.

We were thrilled to see cowslips and pyramid orchids on the Tyning earlier in the year, and the young rowan and crab apples trees have produced their first crop of berries and apples, all of which indicate that our strategies to increase biodiversity on the Tyning are working well.

We'd like to thank those of you who sponsored a bollard tree or an orchard tree. We will be acknowledging the sponsors and identifying tree species on sustainable wooden labels which will be put in place in the autumn.

In the autumn we'll also be arranging further seed sowing and bulb planting days, and in Spring 2024 we'll be inviting a fruit specialist to visit the orchard and give us tips about how to prune to increase fruit yield. FLiSCA News

Freshford & Limpley Stoke Community Association (FLiSCA) is the community charity which uses the rent and profits from the Galleries Shop & Café to pay out grants to community groups and organisations.

It has been a busy year for FLiSCA with the opening of the £75k café extension and the investment of a further £25k on the new solar panels. This source of solar energy, together with the support of Freshford and Limpley Stoke Energy Community Shares Limited (FLECS) has been critical in helping protect the Galleries Shop and Café against the post-Ukraine fluctuating world energy prices.

In the past year and in addition to supporting a resident in need, FLiSCA has awarded grants to support the Freshford & Limpley Stoke Home Energy Group (FLHEG),

buy the new flags fluttering outside Freshford Village Memorial Hall, build the raised beds in front of Galleries, equip the new kitchen in St Peter's Church and help fund Freshford School's new playground equipment. Since inception, FLiSCA has awarded grant of almost £80,000 and the upturn in the Galleries Shop & Café's business will allow us to award more grants in 2024. Nature Chain

We have been putting a focus on hedgehogs this year and can report at least a few sightings around Freshford and Limpley Stoke which is encouraging - at least we have a local population to nurture and increase. Please go to our website (below) to see our articles on how to help them. Ahead of the Autumn and Winter, we have also purchased a few hedgehog boxes to put into communal areas to provide places for hedgehogs to hibernate and hope to arrange a talk from an expert to tell us how we can help hedgehogs further.





Talking of boxes, we have also installed a little owl box and barn owl box locally and are keeping fingers crossed that they will be used next year. Thanks to several people on the team and also to FLiSCA and Alan Duck for help in various ways.

We started the season in March with a talk on moths in our gardens by Freshford resident Robert Kelsh. Robert treated us to a very entertaining talk and opened our eyes to just how many types of moths we have in Freshford and Limpley Stoke he has caught well over a hundred different species in a single night!

In the same month, we also kicked off a feasibility study by Young wilders consultancy The group has been concentrating on hedgehogs recently and has some camera traps which can be borrowed and set up in your garden.

Four hedgehog boxes have been made and placed at various sites around the villages. An article on hedgehogs will be on Nature Chain's October newsletter. Other talks and films are planned.

Maintaining and planting wildflower seeds around the villages is ongoing, as are building links with other villages, such as Winsley, Westwood, Wellow and also the school. Come May, the Freshford Beavers did a grand job helping plant wild flowers in the Limpley Stoke Park and it was then the turn of bees in June with the showing of the film 'My Garden of a Thousand Bees' - a wonderful exploration of bees in the Bristol garden of film maker Martin Dorhn in his own garden during lockdown. This was so well received that we hope to show it again in the coming months.

Also in June was the Village Fete and we had a stall with quizzes and kit to make your own bird feeder - people seemed to have fun and hopefully we all learned something! And, meanwhile, the beautiful and insectfriendly flower patches by team members Paul Jupp and Loulou Brouard at both the entrance to the Freshford Hall and Galleries, and at the entrance to Midford Lane, continue to delight.

As well as events mentioned above for the future, we also hope to have talks on beavers and sustainable rivers, as well as a bat walk, so we hope to see you there!

Phase 1 of the project to secure the exterior shell of the building (roof, walls and windows) is almost complete and is on-budget. Along the way we have uncovered some fascinating facts about this 16th century building (to learn more please sign up to one of our Hard Hat Tours) and, thanks to the experienced professionals working for us and our army of skilled volunteers we have an exciting plan to sensitively refurbish the interior to ensure the Hop Pole will, once again, be a sustainable and vibrant village pub and hub.



To achieve this we are about to announce a second share issue to raise the £300k to complete this project. If we fail, we will be forced to abandon this project but if we succeed the Hop Pole can remain at the heart of our community for another 500 years. It's crunch time but we are confident that, with your support, we will be able to reopen the Hop Pole in the summer of 2024.

Inspiring craftsmen on board James Crossman of Iron Age Forge and John Yeo, glass conservator, are teaming up to bring their craft skills to bear on the Hop Pole windows. They are generously giving their time and expertise to fabricate new windows to closely emulate those that would have once been present.



In addition, the repair works team learnt that the pub is built of stone set in Earth mortar, and were totally astonished to discover that the ground of the pub is the main source of this mortar. With help from Pete Walker of University of Bath and Sam Clayson of SSHC, the team along with our brilliant volunteers went digging in the Hop Pole garden and surrounding areas to find the material to match the existing mortar, which will now be used to consolidate and repair the walls. A wonderful, traditional process that continues to add to our inspiring journey.

LIMPLEY STOKE AND FRESHFORD LINK

Link

Limpley Stoke and Freshford Link was set up in 1989 in Limpley Stoke, and later extended to Freshford, to help people make journeys to destinations outside the reach of public transport. Common destinations are hospitals, surgeries, shops and supermarkets, but Link also provides a service for a wide range of social or personal needs. If in any doubt, ring and ask. Link functions, therefore, as a resource for those of us who are experiencing a problem with transport which cannot be easily resolved in any other way. The scheme is run by members of a committee drawn from both villages and further details may be found on each village website. Funding

Link is a voluntary organisation, and all its drivers are volunteers using their own cars. Drivers receive expenses to cover the cost of petrol. The other principal expenses are insurance and the cost of the mobile phone. To pay for the cost of covering these expenses we ask for donations from users. Drivers carry special envelopes stamped with Link for donations which can either be returned to the driver or handed in to the Galleries shop. Donations are welcome — Link cannot run without them —but they are not obligatory.

How to Use the Link

Phone one of the Link co-ordinators on 07714169216. Leave a message and a phone number if you get a recorded reply. Give details of name, date, time and destination, and the co-ordinator will make every effort to get a driver for you and ring you back. If possible, give two days' notice.

New Drivers

Link provides an essential device for those in need of a lift. The more drivers we can call upon, the more likely we are to find one when needed, and the less likely to make demands on those already volunteering. Drivers are seldom asked to make more than one journey a month.

If you can find a little time to volunteer, please do so. Link provides an invaluable service to those who need transport, and there is no obligation to make yourself available if it is not convenient for you.

Your Community Oil Buying Scheme – buying oil together, to pay lower prices.

If you rely on oil for your heating and hot water, then you may have considered joining a syndicate buying group...but did you know you have your own, local, well-established group, buying throughout BaNES, North Somerset, South Gloucester and Bristol? The West of England Rural Network is a local charity promoting rural sustainability. Already well recognised in the community as the organisation from which the Village Agents operate, they have additionally, over the last 10 years, been successfully operating a syndicate oil buying scheme, aimed at reducing rural fuel poverty. By placing a single, large order once a month and negotiating with multiple national suppliers to get the best price, members may on average pay 6 pence per litre less than the average high street oil price.

Thanks to a grant awarded by Quartet Community Foundation, annual membership (*normally £20/year for domestic users) is free for domestic heating oil users aged 70 and over. The scheme is open to all residents, community buildings (£30/year) and businesses (£100/year) within Bath and North East Somerset, North Somerset, South Gloucestershire and Bristol.

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THE BUS/ TIME TABLE

The 94 Bus update

The Parish Council is disappointed that, since the last community email in June, there is relatively little more to report on the longterm future of the 94 bus service. The only information that we've received about the future of the bus is from Unitary Cllr Johnny Kidney, who represents affected parishes in Wiltshire. He's advised that Wiltshire Council will continue to fully fund the 94 service until at least Christmas.



The Bathavon Ward Councillor Fiona Gourley has reported back to the Parish Council on meetings she has had with the Wiltshire Council Cabinet Member for Transport, B&NES' Deputy Leader with responsibility for Sustainable Travel, and bus officers. A cross-party letter has been sent to the Government's Minister for Buses and to the West of England Combined Authority. At a meeting with WECA's Metro-Mayor, Ward Cllr Gourley suggested that, of the bus services under threat, the No. 94 bus was more financially viable because of its crosscounty funding model.

A cross-party petition is being organised for presentation to the WECA Board meeting on 6 October 2023, subject to obtaining enough signatures. We'll let residents have details when this is launched. In the meantime residents can show their support for the 94 bus by using it! Like all buses, fares are currently £2 for adults and £1 for children. The 94 operates from Monday – Friday, on an approximately 2 hour service. Could residents let visitors know about the bus should they want to visit Bath, it drops off passengers on Grand Parade in the heart of the city. See timetable and route.

The PreSchool

We become 'Freshford Preschool Forest School' this year, allowing us to head out every week for our dedicated Forest school sessions. VILLAGE AGENT

Your Village Agent

I thought it was time for another update from me about the work myself and other VA colleagues have been doing in the area over the past few busy weeks.

We started a project In March in the RUH with our partner AGE UK bringing the services of B&NES Wellbeing Hub to patients, visitors and staff so they have direct access to services, information and advice that supports people to live independently at home. Following on from this work, we have become partners in a brilliant new project there that can help to streamline the discharge process for patients by improving access to a range of support B&NES residents can receive when they are discharged and go home, minimizing the risk of re admission. And, we also now have a presence in St Martins and Paulton hospitals too. My employer, The West of England Rural Network have for several years been successfully running a Community Oil Buying Scheme in the B&NES area. Its free to join for anyone who is 70 years or older and for anyone else there is a £20 membership fee. Typically members pay 6 or 7 pence per litre LESS than average high street prices saving a minimum of £120 per year. For more information call Karen on: 07825 202043 or email karen@wern.org.uk. We work in partnership with the Centre for Sustainable Energy and last month I asked them to visit a resident I have been supporting in a local village to do a mini audit of how much they were paying monthly for their energy bill and do checks on other "utility" usage and expenses. They got their energy payments reduced by £45 a month, with a £131 rebate and their mobile phone cost down by £10 a month.That added up to an annual saving of £664 + £131 = £795! This resident lives in a one bedroom bungalow. That was a result! (What could the potential savings be in a larger home?) And with the help of Age UK we are supporting the resident in applying for Attendance Allowance which is likely to bring in another £272 per month, £3264 per annum....tax free and it's not Means tested....and we are supporting them to apply for a Blue Badge.

VILLAGE AGENT

Question, would you ever NOT claim your old age pension?Of course not, you are entitled to it and have paid your NI contributions for years! So why is it, other payments people could be entitled to aren't claimed? As a Village Agent I often come across residents who could but aren't claiming Attendance Allowance, or Carers Allowance, or Disability Living Allowance and Council Tax benefit. I am now finding more residents I come across in my villages are "asset rich but cash poor" and they aren't claiming the benefits they are entitled to, indeed some people don't feel its right that they do. But some are struggling to make ends meet.

It's currently estimated £15bn goes unclaimed, up to 3.4 million pensioners are not claiming Attendance Allowance, 400,000 are not claiming Carers Allowance and many hundreds of thousands more aren't claiming other allowances and grants they are entitled to. Parish Council Update

May 2023 saw local elections being held across B&NES. In Freshford, as in many other local parishes, there weren't enough candidates to require an election of parish councillors.

We said a fond farewell to those councillors who stood down:- Jean Hawker, Annabel Batchelor-Wylam and Ben Walters. Jean was a longserving councillor who worked for the community over many years. Annabel had done a great job liaising with Freshford School & as part of the Cemetery Advisory Group, and Ben had brought useful experience and knowledge on planning matters and the environment to the Council.

Since then we've been joined by Jessie Forbes and Jennifer Clamp – a warm welcome to both new councillors and we look forward to them getting involved in local matters.

We currently have seven councillors, with two vacant positions. We're really keen to fill these posts. With more people, your Parish Council can achieve more things! We're looking for community-minded people with a variety of different skills, interests and experience. Please consider if there's something you can bring to the Parish Council to help your local community thrive.

Here are some of the activities that the Parish Council has been involved with since the last edition of the Newsletter:

• **Street Lighting** – Following consultation with residents, we're obtaining quotes from two companies to implement a trial switch-off of some lights over the winter period. This project is more complex than it at first seems, and we'll keep residents fully informed. A further consultation is planned following the trial.

• **Traffic Speed** - Data from the recently installed speed radar camera has been reviewed and indicates that the device is having a positive impact on reducing motorists' speed.

- **Street Cleaning** - A new Village Steward contract has been operating since March, to undertake path clearance, vegetation strimming, etc. If you see something that you think the Village Steward team could address please let us know.

• 94 Bus Service - Councillors remain concerned about the uncertain future of the 94 bus service (more details about this matter are on page 23). Since this issues arose, councillors have liaised with the West of England Combined Authority (WECA), B&NES, our MP and other local parishes to make sure local concerns are heard. Councillors continue to liaise with Ward Councillor Fiona Gourley for updates and information on what the Parish Council and local residents can do. • Parking - There's been liaison with B&NES about possible yellow lines in the village. The Parish Council will consult with residents about proposals before deciding whether to apply to B&NES to have the

lines considered for installation.

• **Waste** - We've worked with the Memorial Hall and B&NES to have a new bin installed (and emptied!) by the park at the back of the Hall.

• **Cemetery** - The Parish Council continues to listen to residents ideas' about maintaining the Cemetery in a way that preserves it as a place of tranquillity, but enables nature to thrive.

• **Renewable Energy** - Councillors continue to work with Bath and West Community Energy (BWCE) and local parishes to explore the potential for a solar project in the area.

It's fitting to end this article by paying tribute to Nick Stevens and to Martin Walker. Both Nick and Martin were active members of the Freshford community and made significant contributions to the Parish Council, as well as other local organisations, over a number of years. They will be sorely missed.

RIVER BLITZ

RiverBlitz project

River water quality is of growing concern these days with calls for action to clean up our rivers.



With this in mind, Emily Pennant-Rea and I took part in the Bristol Avon RiverBlitz citizen science project this July. This is the first time either of us had taken part. We were provided with their easy-to-use water quality testing kits which meant we took a small sample of water from the river, inserted a test paper which changed colour and then matched it against a colour chart to gauge the amount of nitrates and phosphates in the sample. We did this for two sites, one on the Frome near the Freshford Inn and the other on the Avon near the swimming spot on the footpath towards Jess's kissing gate.

Our samples showed the same readings for both sites, with the nitrates being at a high level and the phosphates being at a low level. Nitrates and phosphates are amongst the most common pollutants of freshwater environments and can have wide ranging harmful effects on wildlife. They can enter our watercourses from various sources, such as pesticides and fertilisers washing into our rivers, waste from livestock, sewage overflows, and even treated sewage discharges as treating wastewater does not remove all chemicals.

Unfortunately the general picture is that pollution is getting worse in the Bristol Avon River Trust area (BART). 193 citizen scientists helped with sampling rivers in July, gathering 293 samples. The data will help target further investigations and future conservation work and help monitor water quality in the years to come. The results show that when nitrate and phosphate results are combined, 89% of sample locations recorded high levels of nutrients, with only 1 out of the 293 sample locations showing a low concentration. 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
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
